

NEW JERSEY ENERGY ISSUE POLL

Overview

New Jersey voters who identify as moderate, somewhat conservative or somewhat liberal are in the dark about New Jersey's energy policies and the implications it has on their households. At the start of the poll, energy ranked as a second-tier issue for most swing voters, with just 7.3% calling it their "top issue" this election. But once voters were informed of the real-world costs of the state's policies—including a 20% utility rate hike, a \$1.4 trillion price tag for renewables, and the 2035 gas car ban—support dropped and concern spiked:

- The percentage ranking energy among their top 3 issues **jumped 18.6 points**, from 45.1% to 63.7%.
 - O What's especially notable is the **spread**—that is, the difference between those ranking energy high versus low in priority. It moves from a slightly negative **-5.3%** to a strongly positive **+30.2%**, for a **net lift of 35.5 points**.
- Support for the 2035 mandate dropped by 10 full points.
 - The spread on issue importance (top 3 issues) sees a **net lift of 23.4 points**.
- After learning about the implications of the policy, a majority (52%) said the rate increase made them less supportive of state energy policy.

The New Jersey Statewide Survey was conducted by Wick Insights using online panel interviews from May 24-28 among a sample of 600 likely 2025 voters who identify as moderate, somewhat conservative or somewhat liberal.
